Dental Hygiene

- 1. What kinds of animals do you recommend dental hygiene for?

 Hygienic practices are at the recommendation of their respective veterinarian.
- 2. What age ranges do you recommend dental cleanings for? All age ranges? Does the animal have to be a certain age before getting a dental cleaning? With regards to companion animals such as dogs and cats, this often depends on the species and breed. They do not have to be a certain age before getting a dental cleaning as long as they can safely undergo a general anesthesia.
- 3. How often should an animal receive a dental cleaning?

 This depends on the species and breed. I'm always thrilled if pet owners can manage to brush their pets teeth on their own.
- 4. Is the under anesthesia dental office visit safe for the animals?

 There is always risk to any kind of anesthesia. Most dental prophylactic treatments last anywhere from 45 minutes to an hour.
- 5. Should a pet owner clean their own pet's teeth by hand without anesthesia?

 There are soft finger cups and soft tooth brushes available for brushing your pet's teeth. I never recommend using human toothpaste to brush your pet's teeth as some of the ingredients can be harmful to animals. I recommend just plain water or enzymatic toothpaste formulated for animals.
- 6. What are the possible/likely consequences if dogs/cats do not receive dental cleanings?

Developing severe dental disease causes halitosis (bad breath) and can be very painful especially if there is an infection and fractured tooth. Significant dental disease in animals can lead to other systemic problems such as cardiac disease.

7. What is the cost of a dental cleaning?

This depends on the age, health, and stage of dental disease. See your veterinarian for cost estimates.

Pet Food Labels - Did You Know?

- Meat or poultry by-products are parts of slaughtered animals such as lungs, spleens, kidneys, blood and bones. They are not desirable for humans but are generally okay for animals.
- Animal carcasses that are rendered (cooked to remove fat and water) are then dried and ground and called meat or poultry "meal."
- If a label simply says "beef" it should be 95% beef.
- The word "dinner" or "entrée" means the food contains 25% meat.
- The phrase "contains beef" or "meaty flavor" denotes even less than 25% meat.
